A reading from Paul's letter to the Romans

8. 1-11

There is therefore now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus. For the law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus has set you free from the law of sin and of death. For God has done what the law, weakened by the flesh, could not do: by sending his own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh, and to deal with sin, he condemned sin in the flesh, so that the just requirement of the law might be fulfilled in us, who walk not according to the flesh but according to the Spirit. For those who live according to the flesh set their minds on the things of the flesh, but those who live according to the Spirit set their minds on the things of the Spirit. To set the mind on the flesh is death, but to set the mind on the Spirit is life and peace. For this reason the mind that is set on the flesh is hostile to God; it does not submit to God's law—indeed it cannot, and those who are in the flesh cannot please God. But you are not in the flesh; you are in

the Spirit, since the Spirit of God dwells in you. Anyone who does not have the Spirit of Christ does not belong to him. But if Christ is in you, though the body is dead because of sin, the Spirit is life because of righteousness. If the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will give life to your mortal bodies also through his Spirit that dwells in you.
This is the Word of the Lord. **Thanks be to God.**

Listen to the Gospel of Christ according to St. Matthew Glory to you, O Lord.

13. 1-9, 18-23

That same day Jesus went out of the house and sat beside the lake. Such great crowds gathered around him that he got into a boat and sat there, while the whole crowd stood on the beach. And he told them many things in parables, saying: 'Listen! A Sower went out to sow. And as he sowed, some seeds fell on the path, and the birds came and ate them up. Other seeds fell on rocky ground, where they did not have much soil, and they sprang up quickly, since they had no depth of soil. But when the sun rose, they were scorched; and since they had no root, they withered away. Other seeds fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. Other seeds fell on good soil and brought forth grain, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty. Let anyone with ears listen!' 'Hear then the parable of the sower. When anyone hears the word of the kingdom and does not understand it, the evil one comes and snatches away what is sown in the heart; this is what was sown on the path. As for what was sown on rocky ground, this is the one who hears the word and immediately receives it with joy; yet such a person has no root, but endures only for a while, and when trouble or persecution arises on account of the word, that person immediately falls away. As for what was sown among thorns, this is the one who hears the word, but the cares of the world and the lure of wealth choke the word, and it yields nothing. But as for what was sown on good soil, this is the one who hears the word and understands it, who indeed bears fruit and yields, in one case a hundredfold, in another sixty, and in another thirty.'

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

Praise to you, O Christ.

Meditation:

Matthew speaks of a farmer sowing seeds, some fall on a path and are eaten by birds, others fall where there are rocks but little soil so even though the plants could grow quickly, the sun dries them and they die from lack of soil. Then we hear of the seeds that fall among the weeds and thorns which stop the seeds from growing and finally Matthew speaks of the seeds that fall on good soil and grow. Everything Matthew speaks of is understandable so what is the parable trying to teach us.

Firstly, it shows the different ways that people respond to their faith and also questions ourselves as to which best describes each one of us. The first way of responding to God is represented by the path. The path is ground that has become so hard that the seed doesn't have a chance to grow.

The next style of response spoken about in the parable is a shallow person.—not shallow in their personality but shallow in their faith as they accept God's message and accept it well at first but when they are taken out of the safe environment of for example their church or workplace then things become very different. It is possible that the last thing they would want to do is stand up and be counted as a Christian. But what happens if people in work don't share the same Christian values, do we stick to our faith? or do we become weak in our faith? Strangely enough it is when we are most weak that God helps us the most as being a Christian is not something that we do on our own or in our own strength.

The third type of person could be called the distracted as they listened to God's word and started to put it into practice but then they let all the distractions of this life build up around them and choke their faith just as the weeds and thorns stopped the seeds from growing

The final group of people are fruitful people. These are people who let God's word fully into their lives and allow it to do its work; changing them into the kind of people God wants them to be. God wants to make us more like Jesus, being people who not only hear God's word but retain God's Word.

On hearing the parable and the explanation, we now need to think about how we not only as individuals and Christians can be the seeds that fell in the good soil and ask how do we improve our relationship with God.

The answer may be, if we are the seeds of the good soil, we should be attempting to help the people represented by the other seeds through living out our Christian faith in our thoughts, words and actions. In other words, we are communicating with people. Communication is so important as just showing an act of kindness or enquiring about someone who has been ill could be all it takes to help someone who has fallen by the wayside return to their faith.

Faith is one of those parts of our lives that we don't just need to work at now and again. Faith is something we need to work at constantly.

One important aspect of developing our faith is through prayer which is an opportunity for two way communication between us and God, a conversation with God where we can talk to Him about our happiness, our sadness, our loneliness, our worries and where we can also ask Him for help, direction and guidance in our lives. God is someone we can talk to about anything and someone we can turn to for help.

The wonderful thing about God is that no matter what we say to Him, he never fails to listen.

The parable teaches us about trust because when we trust Jesus he will teach us and through us following his teachings we will change because Jesus will change us. An anagram of the word team is mate, a friend and that is what Jesus is to us our friend as long as we keep reminding ourselves that we too need to improve our listening skills so that we continue to be taught by Jesus. If we want to be taught by Jesus we need to remind ourselves that the seeds in the parable were equal in their make up, it was the soil where they fell that allowed them to grow differently.

Now we need to ask ourselves one question **Which kind of soil are we like?**
Amen.
